

WHAT IS A **COMMUNITY FIRE UNIT?**

A Community Fire Unit or CFU is a resource ACT Fire & Rescue can activate during a Bushfire. The CFU's objective is to reduce the impacts from bushfires on life and property.



Uncontrolled bushfires in forests, woodlands or grasslands, pose an immediate threat to properties and people in Bushfire Prone Areas.



WHO IS THE COMMUNITY FIRE UNIT?

A CFU is a team of volunteers that live in the same Bushfire Prone Area on the urban interface. The volunteers are trained to safeguard their homes during a bushfire.



Each unit has **10 to 30** members and an operational & training area that covers **50 to 80** homes

In the event of a bushfire, the CFU team is activated within their operational area.

VOLUNTEERING WITH A COMMUNITY FIRE UNIT

Neighborhoods benefit when locals volunteer in the Community Fire Unit Program.

- Localised traffic control during incidents
